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LGBTQ+ Characters Add Depth and Diversity at CAAMFest 2017

Unique settings, identities and actions provide a phenomenal slate of LGBTQ+ stories

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9, 2017 – The <u>Center for Asian American Media</u> (CAAM) celebrates the rich diversity of identity and sexuality that intersects throughout many stories during <u>CAAMFest 2017</u>. Asian and Asian American LGBTQ+ characters and voices enter spheres of politics, culture, history, race and identity, leading to fascinating moments and conversations.

HIGHLIGHTS:

RE:ORIENTATIONS - part of the Asian American Documentary Competition

- Directed by Richard Fung
- San Francisco Bay Area premiere
- Fung's new documentary updates his 1980s <u>ORIENTATIONS: LESBIAN AND GAY ASIANS</u>,
 revisiting many of the original subjects while also exploring a new generation of fresh
 faces. Fung captures a unique blend of voices through three decades of community,
 politics and identity.
- Preceded by short, <u>SEMIOTICS OF SAB</u>, by <u>Tina Takemoto</u>, that tells the story of gay Japanese American <u>Sab Shimono</u>, whose stage and screen acting spans more than five decades.

<u>OUT/HERE</u> (shorts program): Breaking the barriers of tradition and commonplace is not a walk in the park. The ups and downs of this shorts program will guide you through the experiences of diverse LGBTQ+ protagonists and their quests for acceptance in the face of uncertainty.

- THE BOOK OF LIVING AND DYING, by Sara Yang, tells the story of a cancer-stricken mother who tries to escape death by convincing her daughter to travel with her to Tibet.
- DRUGS FOR UNICORNS, by Jaq Nguyen, follows a very sick unicorn, ill from toxins, who embarks on a journey to find a healer and get better.
- **ESCAPING AGRA**, by <u>Pallavi Somusetty</u>, documents Naveen Bhat, trapped in India after their parents discover their gender and sexual orientation, and Bhat's journey to battle them in court and piece their life back together.
- NU'Ô'C, by Quyên Nguyen-Le, is an experimental narrative about a queer Vietnamese

- American teen trying to understand their mom's experience as a war refugee.
- PRIA, by Yudho Aditya, is the story of an LGBTQ teen in rural Indonesia, struggling between his traditional upbringing and a romantic idealization of freedom in the west.
- THE RIGHT BANK, by Yvonne Li, explores a young Chinese lesbian's fear of rejection from her conservative mother and the courage she needs to save her relationship with her American girlfriend.
- TWO-SIDED RIDE, by Jason Karman, hops in the passenger seat with a hopeless romantic rideshare driver, traveling around in hopes of a love connection in the big city.

ADDITIONAL FILMS:

- **AKA SEOUL**, by <u>Jon Maxwell</u>, travels with five Korean adoptees, raised around the world, as they return to Seoul, finding cultural experiences and tearful reunions.
- <u>BROWN GIRLS</u>, a new web series loosely based on creator <u>Fatimah Asghar</u>'s own life, paints an intimate portrait of two young women of color navigating their relationships, families, sexual orientations and the messiness of being in your mid-20s.
- CHEE AND T, by Tanuj Chopra, introduces a dynamic duo whose adventures in Silicon Valley capture the growing pains of becoming an adult in an overtly selfish world.
