As reality hits and Sami quickly learns his dreams will be harder to achieve than he thought, Sami is forced to look inward and decide what kind of person he wants to be. Khan's film is a testament to the immigrant experience, and the meaningful, invaluable contributions they make to American history and society.

 Richards, which travels Nisha Thapa's spiritual journey and her experiences in Nepal.
- BROWN GIRLS (USA), a new web series loosely based on creator <u>Fatimah Asghar</u>'s own life, paints an intimate portrait of two young women of color navigating their relationships, families, sexual orientations and the messiness of being in your mid-20s.
- CHEE AND T, by Tanuj Chopra, introduces a dynamic duo whose adventures in Silicon Valley capture the growing pains of becoming an adult in an overtly selfish world.
- OUR TIME (USA), by Arpita Kumar, is part of the IMMEDIATE FAMILY shorts program and follows a child who discovers the rupture in her family and is forced to make a

difficult choice.
