

CAAMFest 2014 Shines a Spotlight on Vietnamese and Vietnamese Americans

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13, 2014 — The Center for Asian American Media (CAAM) is dedicated to showcasing talent among the wide array of Asians and Asian Americans in media: this year's festival features work from prominent Vietnamese and Vietnamese Americans. From a romantic comedy about a Vietnamese American fashion designer to a gripping documentary on finding home, to a female rapper making waves in the Vietnamese music scene, CAAMFest 2014 serves up an outstanding lineup of notable trailblazers.

A FASHIONABLE OPENING NIGHT

CAAMFest 2014 opens with style with the North American premiere of the Vietnamese box office hit HOW TO FIGHT IN SIX INCH HEELS. Directed by Ham Tran (JOURNEY FROM THE FALL) and starring Bay Area native Kathy Uyen (SUPERCAPITALIST, PASSPORT TO LOVE), the delightful romantic comedy keeps in the spirit of fashion-savvy films like THE DEVIL WEARS PRADA to tell the story of Anne (Uyen), a high-strung New York-based fashion designer who flies to Vietnam after she finds out that her fiancé may be having an affair. Comedy ensues when she infiltrates Saigon's high fashion world.

When Uyen would go to auditions in America she was deemed "too Asian." When her career brought her to Vietnam, they would say she was "too American." This inspired Uyen to carve her own niche in entertainment that would bridge the gap between Vietnamese and Vietnamese American. In addition to starring in HOW TO FIGHT IN SIX INCH HEELS, she helped write the story and is a co-producer. Uyen and Tran are both CAAM alums and their film is a prime example of how homegrown trailblazers like them are making a significant impact on the global film market.

A STATE OF STATELESSENESS

In the harrowing documentary STATELESS, director Duc Nguyen follows the lives of Vietnamese refugees who have been living in the Philippines in a condition of statelessness for 16 years. Many may be familiar with the mass exodus of Vietnamese refugees following the 1975 fall of Saigon, but most do not know that there are still Vietnamese refugees seeking asylum today. Nguyen documents the hopes and fears of these refugees as they wait for an opportunity for resettlement in the United States. The film will be preceded with the CAAM co-founded short EMPLOYED IDENTITY directed by Bao Nguyen. Also starring Uyen from HOW TO FIGHT, the web series explores the phenomenon of the Vietnamese diaspora returning to the country of their parents' birth, to find both themselves and successful careers.

VIETNAMESE HIP HOP ROYALTY

Making her U.S. debut at CAAMFest 2014, female rapper Suboi, has been dubbed as the "Vietnamese Queen of Hip Hop." Influenced by Eminem, Snoop Dogg, Linkin Park and Aaliyah, the 23-year-old has the ability to hold her own in a male-dominated music genre and a country that is known for censorship. With personal lyrics inspired by family, love, and social pressures, she has not only broken down barriers but created her own distinct style and has become the first female rapper to achieve success in Vietnam — a success that could soon spill over to American soil.
